

Contextual data

- 5,879,082 residents as at 1 January 2019 11.1% aged 75 and over
- **2,654,183 families** as at 31 December 2018 30.3% made up of a couple with children; 18.0% made up of single people aged 60 and over (on average for the 2017-2018 period)
- The **Metropolitan City of Rome** is home to **73.9% of the population** living in the region, with **48.6%** of the population of Lazio as a whole (2,856,133 residents) residing in the Capital alone (2019)
- **€1,826 spent on healthcare per capita** in 2018
- **120.4** operational beds for the elderly per **10,000** people aged **65** and over in residential health and social care facilities (2016)
- 43,535 places available in nurseries and early childhood services to serve more than 120,000 residents aged under 3 in the region in other words, coverage of 35.3% (2020)

The Welfare Index is used to assess, for any given synthetic indicator, both the aspects associated with expenditure on welfare and the aspects associated with the results produced by this expenditure.

In 2021, Lazio ranked seventh of the Italian regions in terms of the effectiveness and responsiveness of its welfare system, rising by five positions as compared with 2020, when it was in twelfth position in the ranking.

Developments in Welfare Systems

The welfare system of the Italian regions has undergone developments in both its vertical relationships - i.e. between different levels of government - and in its relationships between public and private actors. This ongoing process is transforming a system predominantly based upon the public provision of services into a system that sees the public and private sectors alike participating in detecting needs, promotion, planning and management of the service, all in an integrated way.



The **State**: establishes and monitors the Minimum Levels of Benefits (LEP).



The **Region**: is solely responsible for planning welfare policy and the reorganisation of welfare.



Distinction between the financing function, the management function (in the hands of service providers), and the purchasing function (in the hands of beneficiaries of the service, either directly or through vouchers or Service Vouchers).



Support for families, especially in terms of safeguarding and promoting care work for children, the elderly and care-dependent people.



Expanding and diversifying the services available through authorisation and accreditation systems.







In this context, within the framework of the POR FSE 14-20 - Axis 2 **Social Inclusion and Combatting Poverty**, the Lazio Region implemented a financial tool dubbed the **efamily Global Grant**. This serves to make it possible to plan and manage measures aimed at providing '**Service Vouchers**' for the use of services of high social value, particularly **childcare and care services for care-dependent people**, the management of which was entrusted to the Intermediary Organisation R.T.I. Edenred S.r.I. - Mbs S.r.I. .

Total budget allocated for measures implemented

The main objectives established for the efamily SG were:

- to increase, consolidate and qualify early childhood socio-educational services and care services for care-dependent people
- improve access to affordably-priced, sustainable, high-quality services of high public interest
- allow those with parental responsibility for minors and those with specific care responsibilities to caredependent family members to maintain or improve their employment situation or to have the time to pursue professional training, education, or work placement/return to work programmes









A fully **digitalised process:** the application procedures for both families and providers, as well as voucher management, were made fully digital by means of a **dedicated online platform and information systems created by Edenred**.

Exceptional user-friendliness for participation and use of vouchers for citizens and providers alike.

Simultaneously improving access to and quality of services.

Better balance of time devoted to work/care

By starting to use or increasing use of care services, family members (especially women) gain more time to dedicate to training and looking for work.

Vouchers for services of high social value

Providing Service Vouchers to fund services of high social value, reducing expenditure and allowing families left behind for financial reasons to access them.

Income situation improved

Now with more time to devote to training, study and looking for work, citizens can improve their employment and income situation.

Risk of poverty avoided or reduced

Bearing the costs of services of high social importance provides economic support for families whilst at the same time providing relief for those with a higher care burden, thus triggering a virtuous path towards improvement of their financial situation.






Operational outline of measures



Verification of requirements

Applications are subject to verification of requirements and, if approved, applicants are notified on the **efamily Platform** and via email



Reporting

Service providers or citizens report on the services they have provided/used on the efamily Platform



Submission of applications

Citizens who wish to make a claim submit their applications on the **efamily Platform**

Use of the service

Successful claimants use the service they have been granted vouchers for, provided by participating organisations or professionals

Payment of grants

Once it has been verified that the service has been provided, the relevant grants are paid out via **Edenred's payment systems**





Public announcement of the availability of Service Vouchers intended to pay for assistance and care services for care-dependent people within the Lazio Region

'First-come, first-served' procedure for the provision of Service Vouchers, to a maximum value of €700 per month, for people resident or domiciled within the Lazio Region who are responsible for the care of care-dependent people, intended to cover expenses relating to **health and social care services** (home care, daycare centre, family assistant), for use as from January 2021.



Applicants and beneficiaries

Citizens resident or domiciled within the Lazio Region who are responsible for the care of care-dependent people



Service recipients

Care-dependent people who are resident within the Lazio Region and recipients of care services



Duration

12 monthly payments, starting from the month when the vouchers are activated.

The application window was closed on 15 September 2021 as the allocated budget was exceeded





Applicants by economic indicators



As visible from the chart, despite the threshold for participation being an ISEE value of less than or equal to €50,000, the most significant income bracket is that of applicants with an ISEE value of up to €25,000: there were 956 applicants within this bracket, as compared with 237 in the €25,001 - €40,000 bracket and, finally, 61 in the over-€40,000 bracket.





Objectives achieved

The scheme implemented here is the only one of its kind at the national level in terms of the additional support provided to the families of care-dependent people; indeed, there have been no other similar schemes specifically aimed at family caregivers.



A total of **1,254 families** benefited from it (of which more than 76% had an ISEE value of under €25,000), providing contributions to help them pay for care services, **supporting them financially** and consequently allowing the caregivers who received it to **free up their time and economic resources** and instead devote them to training or looking for work.



The majority of the applicants (i.e. caregivers) were **female** and, **in more than 36% of cases**, **unemployed**, casting a particular light on the importance of **improving the balance between work and care time**.



Service providers gained a new appreciation of the value of the regional accreditation system launched in 2016, whilst families were introduced to providers capable of offering specialised assistance to their family members. What's more, the scheme provided an incentive for the financial stabilisation of family caregivers and cast light on undeclared work.





Public announcement to families in the Lazio Region of the availability of Service Vouchers intended to pay nursery fees within the Lazio Region

Provision of Service Vouchers to families aimed at **reducing the cost of nursery fees** for children (aged 3-36 months) at **accredited nurseries** within the Lazio Region. The value of the Voucher depends on the amount of the nursery fees, reaching a maximum of €337.00 for the 1st edition and €400.00 for the 2nd edition.








Applicants by economic indicators









Objectives achieved

The scheme was intended to supplement other forms of funding for public services already provided by the regional government to Lazio's various municipalities, as well as similar actions operating at the national level.



A total of **2,229 families benefited from it in the first year** and **4,244 in the second,** providing support with the payment of nursery fees for 2,308 and 4,388 minors, respectively (approximately **10% of all authorised nursery places** throughout the entire region).



The grants paid out - which totalled €7,150,791.53 for the periods spanning January 2021 to July 2021 (1st edition) and September 2021 to July 2022 (2nd edition) - reduced the overall cost of nursery fees by more than 50%, with reported average monthly fees of €392.91 being offset by monthly vouchers of an average value of €188.24.



One indirect objective of the scheme was to increase the number of accredited early childhood education services within the regional system. At the time of the Global Grant being launched, there were 369 accredited nurseries, whilst by 7 December 2022, this figure had more than doubled to 781. Over the period that 'efamily' was in operation, 412 nurseries gained accreditation.
