




"The distinguishing characteristic of principles focused evaluation is the focus on principles as the object of evaluation" (2018, p.55).

A study of co-production



- **1**. Co-production depends on resources and relationships.
- 2. Co-production depends on a culture change towards more participatory, reciprocal, and relational ways of working.
- **3.** Co-production is values-based, and depends on respect, listening, and building on people's strengths.
- 4. Learning from how pioneering third-sector organisations have implemented coproduction is key.
- 5. There is an almost unanimous, strongly held view that co-production is full of potential and part of the solution to focusing on people's lives and well-being.
